

Explanation in part 6 to answer in part 4.

I have not received any federal grants in the last three years that are directly relevant to forensic uses of DNA. I am part of the Center for Integrating Research in Genetics and Ethics at Stanford, for which Stanford University has received grants from the National Human Genome Research Institute over the past three years. Some of my research and part of my summer salary has been supported by that grant. Forensic uses of DNA are not part of the grant and have not, to my knowledge, been part of the Center's work under the grant. One post-doctoral fellow affiliated with the Center but not funded under that grant has done some work on family DNA searching.
