

Hi all -

I'm afraid that I'm likely to be on vacation on all three of these dates. You should, of course, proceed without me -- and I'll be happy to support preparation.

Re: experts -

- * Fine with having a C2PA rep presenting content credentials (if it helps - I sit at the C2PA Steering Committee and can request there directly or support Stefanie's request once it comes in). Not to put him on the spot but think Adobe's Andy Parsons would be a great PoC if he's available.
- * We should have someone speak to *other* provenance techniques, as while secure metadata is helpful it is but one of the available technical options there. There's someone from Google whom I think could be quite good but I'm not sure if he's available; and I will think through what 3P researchers could be a good fit otherwise (it's not that common for someone to be deep in all the relevant techniques *and* to have enough practical experience deploying them at scale)
- * In general I agree with you [REDACTED] that Gen-AI powered disinformation, much like any other type of disinformation, can be analyzed both through the content and through the behavioral lens, the latter having the benefit of being technology-agnostic to a large extent and therefore being more future proof. I'm taking from your comment that you may refer to behaviors that are specific to GenAI technology, but this is a good reminder that the vast majority of the techniques deployed in other parts of the Code are useful here as well (from elevating authoritative information to combating coordinated deceptive practices, etc.)

Thanks for your reply and for clarifying the dates, very much appreciated.

Perhaps, given the time constraints, we can set a **deadline of Tuesday 7th COB for the others to reply on the suitability of the time slot on Thursday 30th May from 15:30 - 17:30**. If necessary, we can consider an alternative slot between 14:00 and 18:00 on Friday 31st May.

In terms of focus area, I think it makes sense to have **one expert focusing on provenance tools** as you set out above, so perhaps for that we can ask Stefanie to reach out to her proposed stakeholder **once we have confirmed the Subgroup date**.

From Logically's side, **our positioning is that we take a behaviours-led approach to the issue of disinformation** in the information space, whether that be AI-generated or not, and thus consider it to be both a dissemination *and* content problem. I have an external stakeholder in mind to invite to this end, I am just awaiting the Commission's response separately in case there is any conflict of interest. Should that proposal not work out, **I would be happy to nominate a technical expert internally from Logically to discuss the perspective of a behaviours-led approach**, should that be deemed appropriate by yourself, [REDACTED] and Michael.

Considering that this would leave us with 2 expert slots filled with a discussion on provenance and behaviours, **I will be happy for [REDACTED] and Michael to chime in should they have suggestions of topics / expert stakeholders for another 1-2 speaking slots**.

Re: experts -

* Fine with having a C2PA rep presenting content credentials (if it helps - I sit at the C2PA Steering Committee and can request there directly or support Stefanie's request once it comes in). Not to put him on the spot but think Adobe's Andy Parsons would be a great PoC if he's available.

* We should have someone speak to *other* provenance techniques, as while secure metadata is helpful it is but one of the available technical options there. There's someone from Google whom I think could be quite good but I'm not sure if he's available; and I will think through what 3P researchers could be a good fit otherwise (it's not that common for someone to be deep in all the relevant techniques *and* to have enough practical experience deploying them at scale)

* In general I agree with you [REDACTED] that Gen-AI powered disinformation, much like any other type of disinformation, can be analyzed both through the content and through the behavioral lens, the latter having the benefit of being technology-agnostic to a large extent and therefore being more future proof. I'm taking from your comment that you may refer to behaviors that are specific to GenAI technology, but this is a good reminder that the vast majority of the techniques deployed in other parts of the Code are useful here as well (from elevating authoritative information to combating coordinated deceptive practices, etc.)



Hi Michael,

For me, the primary issue is the lack of communication and clarity in organising this Subgroup meeting. It does not fill me with confidence about our ability to use time in people's calendars meaningfully.

- I have still not seen a version of the agenda that is complete, clear and understandable, and that has approval from all 4 of us
- Clarity regarding the division of responsibilities between the 4 of us and our availability to deliver on those has only started to become clear as of yesterday, which in my view should have been clear weeks ago
- To the best of my knowledge, there has been no pre-brief set up with any external speaker within a reasonable time frame; indeed Andy Parson was still not 100% confirmed to attend at the time that [REDACTED] put me in touch with Andy yesterday. As I had set out before I went on AL, the deliverable was to arrange a short call with confirmed external speakers to pre-brief them on the Subgroup, our work and the relevance of their contributions. This is standard practice and would not have required more than 15-20 minutes.

I would welcome your views to the contrary, and in particular I would be very interested to know about the steps you think we could take to still hold this Subgroup meeting in an efficient manner. However, I must be clear that at this point in time I no longer have the capacity to contribute.

Response to Third technical roundtable European Elections (Online) on July 10, 2024

Dear Mr. Agarwal,

We refer to your email and letter dated 10 June 2024 requesting a written response noting Meta Platforms Ireland Ltd's ("MPIL") plans for finalising a post-election review of our 2024 European Parliamentary Elections ("EP Elections") efforts and any other relevant information before the roundtable scheduled on July 10, 2024.

As mentioned in our previous responses dated 17 May 2024 and 3 June 2024, MPIL takes the integrity of electoral processes very seriously. The conclusion of the EP elections on June 9, 2024 drew to a close year-long preparations by teams across MPIL to identify and mitigate the most pressing platform risks posed by the electoral period. These elections took place against a backdrop of over 90 scheduled elections globally, and were the first EU-wide elections to take place in the context of the Digital Services Act, and its associated Elections Guidelines ("Guidelines") published in the spring.

For the EP elections, MPIL utilised election management processes refined over many years, by teams with expertise in electoral risk mitigation as well as local knowledge and context. We worked hard to adopt feedback from the Commission, Digital Services Coordinators, election authorities, and civil society, making additional adjustments and improvements to our processes in light of the Guidelines and direct discussions undertaken at EC hosted roundtables and a cross-sector tabletop exercise.

Whilst we experienced no major incidents during this electoral period, it was not without its complexity and learnings. As recommended in the Guidelines, MPIL plans to compile a post-election report and publish a public version of this report mid-late September, but in the interim below is a non-exhaustive overview of Meta's impact during the EP election.

Meta's Impact During the EP Elections

Over many years, MPIL has developed a range of tools and processes designed to ensure that platform risks arising from ongoing electoral processes are accurately identified and effectively mitigated. We continuously improve these measures to make sure they remain responsive to risks as they emerge, as well as external feedback. Several of our processes and tools mirror the measures outlined in the Commission's election guidelines.

For the EP elections, we prioritised efforts aimed at addressing risks from adversarial threats (such as the Russia-origin network known as Doppelgänger), infringement of our transparency requirements for political advertisements, and misinformation, including AI-generated misleading content. We deployed mitigation measures to tackle each of these risk areas, as well as running standard mitigation for other election-relevant risks, such as hostile speech.

1. Connecting People to Reliable Information on the Electoral Process

MPIL launched in-app Voter Information Units and Election Day Reminders on Facebook and Instagram, reminding people of the day they can vote in their Member States and re-directing them to local authoritative sources on how and where to vote.

These were complemented by two supporting media literacy efforts, namely a campaign by the European Fact-Checking Standards Network (EFCSN) on how to spot AI-generated and digitally altered media, and the European Regulators Group for Audiovisual Media Services' (ERGA) awareness raising campaign against disinformation.

2. Cooperating with Stakeholders

Our efforts were strengthened by close cooperation with both civil society and election authorities. We onboarded 26 election authorities to a dedicated reporting channel. In addition, we took active part in the EU Disinformation Code Taskforce's Elections Working Group and its Rapid Alert System, with both an email alias and an online form for working group members to report content and trends that were time sensitive, serious or related to protecting the integrity of the electoral process.

3. Combatting Adversarial Threats

At Meta, we have specialised global teams who are focused on stopping coordinated inauthentic behaviour on our platforms. Since 2017, more than 200 Coordinated Inauthentic Behaviour (CIB) networks have been identified and removed by this team. Their efforts are detailed in quarterly Adversarial Threat Reports, the latest of which was published on [May 29, 2024](#). These teams are part of our elections cross-functional team, and work to identify and disrupt specific threats targeting public discourse globally, including ahead of major elections.

In preparation for the 2024 EP elections, these specialist teams conducted a threat ideation session to focus on threats specifically associated with Europe and its elections; organised deep dive sessions with the relevant national authorities in France, Germany and Poland as well as the Commission's team in charge of the Disinformation Code; and designed proactive measures to minimise online risk.

This work included our continued efforts to combat a long running cross-internet covert influence operation from Russia, known as Doppelganger, using a combination of automated technology and manual investigation to stop the majority of Doppelganger's attempts to place ads and typically remove the successfully placed ads within hours of their creation. This allowed us to reject the majority of Doppelganger's attempts to place ads, and led to this operation attempting to evade detection by degrading the quality of their ads – some to a point of illegibility. We provided our contemporary insights on major changes in the Doppelganger network's tactics on our services in our Q1 2024 [Adversarial Threat Report](#).

In addition, whilst public discourse ahead of the EU parliamentary elections focused primarily on foreign threats like Doppelganger, the majority of EU-focused inauthentic behaviour we disrupted ahead of our Q2 Threat Report in May was domestic in nature. This included Coordinated Inauthentic Behaviour in Croatia and more simple inauthentic clusters removed in France, Germany, Poland and Italy – an insight we included in our Q1 2024 Adversarial Threat Report. These clusters and networks had small numbers of assets, primarily targeted audiences in their own countries, were more focused on domestic local elections rather than the EU parliamentary elections, and many were linked to individuals associated with local campaigns or candidates. Where we did see some targeting by foreign actors, including Doppelganger and a handful of simpler inauthentic behaviour clusters, they were primarily focused on undermining support for Ukraine in the EU member states, rather than directly targeting the parliamentary elections.

4. Political Advertisements

Meta provides industry-leading transparency for ads about social issues, elections or politics (SIEP ads), and we reject ads that encourage people not to vote or call into question the legitimacy of upcoming elections. Advertisers who run SIEP ads are required to complete an authorisation process and include a “paid for by” disclaimer, and we remove them if they don’t. Advertisers can only run ads in the countries they are authorised in. Cross-border advertising within the EU is allowed for the EU institutions and registered European political parties and groups.

As the EP elections approached, there were additional measures we adopted to identify and if necessary prevent undeclared political advertisements from being posted on our platforms. These steps included using automation to identify as SIEP any advertisements that contained certain keywords likely to be political in nature, and any advertisements posted by political actors. We also provided extra information to our content reviewers to ensure they had country-level and election-specific contextual information to identify undeclared political advertisements. Finally, we made sure reviewers had tooling that automatically highlighted the names of EP elections candidates, so that content was easier to identify, and improved monitoring of the ads library to check for undeclared SIEP advertisements, misinformation and smear campaigns.

5. Combating Misinformation

We continued to work with our network of 29 fact-checkers in the EU, which is the largest network of any provider. We increased their capacity to rate and review content during the elections. We used keyword detection to group potential misinformation content related to the election in one place to facilitate their work, and organised refresher sessions on our policies attended by 21 organisations. We are seeing encouraging results of this approach, such as Fundación Maldita’s recent report which estimates that over 88% of the election-related misinformation on Facebook, and over 70% on Instagram, received visible action - out-performing all other providers.

6. Efforts to detect and enforce on Deceptive Generative AI

As previously outlined, MPIL’s Community Standards and Advertising Standards apply to content generated by AI. Those policies are complemented by (a) labels on photorealistic images created using Meta AI, (b) tools to detect AI generated images from Google, Microsoft, Adobe, MidJourney, and Shutterstock posted on Facebook, Instagram, or Threads, (c) a feature for people to disclose when they share AI-generated video or

audio, and (d) an obligation on advertisers running ads related to social issues, elections, or politics with Meta to disclose if they use a photorealistic image or video or realistic sounding audio created or altered digitally including with AI. This approach to automatically labelling AI-generated images represents the cutting edge of what's technically possible right now. But it's not yet possible to identify all AI-generated content, and there are ways that people can strip out invisible markers. We're working hard to develop classifiers that can help us to automatically detect AI-generated content, even if the content lacks invisible markers.

MPIL appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on its efforts to manage the EP Elections, and values the constructive, multi-stakeholder and multi-pronged approach that the Commission repeatedly demonstrates in its election readiness work.

We are following up on the last Plenary meeting on the Code's conversion on the 11th of July.

Firstly, to recall, the following way forward was agreed at the meeting:

- Conversion of the Code to a Code of Conduct on **1 January 2025** – process for the conversion to start in autumn while the date of the entry into force fixed to the 1st of January 2025
- A **roundtable dedicated to the question of audit** will be organised between Signatories, auditors, and the Commission as facilitator. The agenda of the meeting will be consulted with you in advance. As discussed at the Plenary meeting, there will be written minutes/takeaways of the meeting.
- A **revised Preamble + a closed list of technical amendments** to address concerns raised by industry signatories on the interplay between the Code, the Digital Services Act and the Transparency and Targeting of Political Advertising Regulation with the following new elements:
 - Revised preamble language on the interplay with the DSA
 - Addition of an additional clause to clarify the links with the Transparency and Targeting of Political Advertising Regulation
 - Deletion of Commitment 44 as a technical amendment - as this is the only commitment in the Code which fully duplicates a DSA requirement without bringing a complementary added value. To be done via the technical amendment list.

Please find attached our proposed **additions and clarifications to the Preamble**, as well as the suggested **Technical Amendments**. Please note that, in view of the summer break, this is a preliminary suggestion that is still under review by our Legal Service.

Thirdly, please find below a **timeline** of the next steps and deadlines to move the process forward decisively:

- 5 September: Signatories to send their comments on the proposed language for the Preamble and technical amendments
- 10 September: Written agreement by VLOPs on the way forward / on the package
- Asap after the Summer break [Date to be agreed]: Audit Roundtable
- 30 September: Submission forms to be sent to the EC
- 1 January 2025: Entry into force of the Code as a Code of Conduct

**Summary of the Roundtable on
Auditing Commitments of the Code of Practice on Disinformation
30 September 2024 (Brussels / Webex)**

1. Background

Article 45 of the Digital Services Act (DSA)¹ encourages the development of voluntary codes of conduct at Union level that can contribute to the proper application of the regulation, taking into account in particular the specific challenges of tackling different types of illegal content and systemic risks. The Code of Practice on Disinformation (hereafter 'the Code') was revised and strengthened in 2022 with this in mind, based on the Commission's Guidance² and anticipating the entry into force of the DSA. The Signatories to the Code aim to convert the Code into a code of conduct under Article 45.

The purpose of the audit roundtable, that took place on 30 September 2024, was to discuss the audit of the Code once converted into a code of conduct against the background of Article 37 DSA and the Delegated Regulation on Audits (DR)³. The meeting was chaired by the Commission services and attended by members of the Permanent Task-force to the Code, including Signatories who are providers of very large online platforms or very large online search engines (VLOPSEs), representatives of civil society organisations (CSOs) and other non-platforms signatories of the Code, auditing organisations and representatives of the European Board for Digital Services ('the Board').

Based on input from VLOPSE signatories, the Commission services had suggested to structure the roundtable around three over-arching topics: the general approach to Code auditing; interactions between the Code and the DSA from the auditing perspective; and auditing in view of the specificity of commitments and of the nature of the services. The present summary of the meeting does not follow the above structure, but rather reflects the main remarks and proposals that emerged during the discussion. They are grouped by topic for a better overview.

This document solely aims to reflect the discussion and cannot be construed as a legal interpretation or guidance from the Commission on the discussed matters. Statements made by the Commission services at the roundtable and summarised in this document do not represent a formal position of the European Commission. The reference to "auditors" and "VLOPSEs" in this document should be understood as summarising positions or statements made by individual participants from the respective groups and not necessarily as a joint or common position of all the participants representing the group.

2. Introduction to the Roundtable

Ms. [Redacted] (Deputy Director General at DG CONNECT) opened the Roundtable by stressing the key role of the Code as an important element of the DSA framework and emphasised that the level of ambition of the Code should not be reduced throughout the process of conversion. The Commission noted that the meeting was not to discuss the Year 1 DSA audit, and that learnings from this process

could be gathered at a later time. Providing an overview, the Commission services introduced the key features of codes of conduct and of audits under the DSA and DR and provided some background on the Code. The Commission services underlined that they see the Code as an important and ambitious instrument to address the spread of online disinformation. The Code commitments and measures relevant for VLOPSEs, if properly implemented, can represent a strong risk mitigation measure by VLOPSEs to address Article 34 DSA systemic risks the systemic risks linked to disinformation, depending on the results of the VLOPSEs' risk assessment exercises. Moreover, the Commission services recalled that the Code, once converted to a code of conduct, will become a set of best practices against disinformation recognised by the Commission and the Board. In this regard, as indicated in DSA recital 104, the refusal without proper explanations by a provider of an online platform or an online search engine a VLOPSE of the Commission's invitation to participate in the application of such a code of conduct could be taken into account, where relevant, when determining whether the provider VLOPSE is complying with the obligations laid down by the DSA. At the same time, it is important to note that not all commitments may be relevant, pertinent and practicable to all signatories, and that a negative audit outcome regarding the Code does not equal an infringement of DSA obligations.

The Commission services recalled that auditing the Code should follow the requirements found in the DSA and the DR. Providers of VLOPSE are subject, at least once a year, to independent audits that assess compliance with Commitments undertaken pursuant to codes of conduct (Article 37(1)(b) DSA).

Prior to any audit procedure, the audited provider shall transmit to the selected auditing organisation a description of any the internal controls and benchmarks for each audited Code commitment (Article 5 DR). The audited provider must make specific additional information available to the auditing organisation regarding codes of conduct to which it is a signatory (Article 17(1) DR).

Prior to the audit procedure, the auditing organisation must carry out a risk analysis. This shall take into account in particular the nature of the audited service and the nature of the audited commitments, among other things (Article 9 DR). The auditing organisation must use appropriate auditing methodologies to reduce the assessed audit risks to a level that enables reaching audit conclusions with a reasonable level of assurance (Article 10 DR).

The audit opinion on compliance with the DSA is separate from audit opinions on each code of conduct under the DSA (Article 8 DR).

Regarding the timing of the audit, the Commission services explained that the audit period for signatories starts as soon as reasonably possible (with the date to be published for certainty) once the Code is converted. If the Code is converted, as agreed, as of 1 January 2025, the first audit period may should be shorter, to align it with the DSA audit for the following year. It is important to note that these timescales do not contemplate how the Code would apply for later signatories to the Code.

When it comes to CSOs and non-platform signatories of the Code, Global Disinformation Index and Science Feedback noted their unique roles as non-platform signatories to the Code and expressed their willingness to provide support during the auditing process, where possible.

3. Discussion on auditing the Code commitments

3.1 Level of audit and definition of benchmarks

The Commission services indicated that Article 37 DSA and Article 10 DR require VLOPSEs to be audited on their compliance with all commitments they sign up to under the Code. The commitments and the corresponding measures that are relevant or pertinent to their services are identified in the signatories' respective subscription documents to the Code. Auditors indicated that, absent Commission guidance, assessing compliance with a given commitment would take into account these corresponding measures, Qualitative Reporting Elements (QREs) and Service Level Indicators (SLIs). Hence, absent Commission guidance, individual VLOPSEs subject to the auditing obligation will be asked to should provide auditors with documentation related to the QREs and SLIs for all the measures they, as a provider of a specific service, have individually subscribed to. Auditors also pointed out that the various commitments, measures, QREs and SLIs are often drafted in unclear and ambiguous terms in the Code, which is expected to make the audit a challenging process. Auditors invited the Commission to come up with standards or a framework to facilitate this process.

The Commission services explained that these measures describe the specific means through which signatories intend to achieve the objective of the commitment, and QREs and SLIs provide the evidence that the measures have been implemented, with the QREs and SLIs featuring in the regular reporting under the Code.

VLOPSEs also voiced concerns about the challenges with the preparation and anticipated burden of the Code audit, considering its scale and magnitude, as well as the level of detail and ambiguity of the Code's commitments, measures, and QREs and SLIs. They noted uncertainty about being able to document their internal controls in time for the first audit for all the commitments they are have signed up to in 2022. To ease the burden, VLOPSEs proposed to only consider a subset of QREs and SLIs that each provider would identify as the most relevant benchmark(s) for its audited service(s) for the purpose of the audit in the first audit.

Auditors indicated that reaching audit conclusions with a reasonable level of assurance, as required under the DR, is too high a standard and will may be difficult to achieve especially for the first audit. They acknowledged that even if platforms have internal controls for each commitment in place, these may not yet be 'mature' enough to serve as basis for the audit and therefore they most likely have to switch to a substantive approach.

The Commission services flagged the need to preserve compliance with the reasonable assurance requirement as defined in the DR. At the same time, they stressed that VLOPSEs enjoy some flexibility in interpreting and further defining commitments, measures, QREs and SLIs they sign up to under the QREs and SLIs set in the Code, in particular for the purposes of the first audit. Notably, Article 5 DR requires and empowers VLOPSEs to determine their internal controls and benchmarks for the various commitments and transmit those to the auditor prior to the beginning of the audit procedure. This helps to ensure that the audit accounts for the specific nature of the audited service, including between VLOPs and VLOSEs. Nevertheless, the Commission services and auditors stressed that the relevant benchmarks and internal controls defined by the individual VLOPSEs for each commitment under Article 5 DR should

not excessively depart from measures and QREs/SLIs and should take inspiration from them, not least to prepare the Code audit reports for public scrutiny.

Auditors explained that they will assess the information provided by the VLOPSE, which should be appropriate and sufficient to reduce audit risks and is the basis to form an audit conclusion and opinion (Article 11 DR). If they cannot rely on the information provided and on testing internal controls, they will have to conduct more substantive procedures such as test samples, data analysis, etc. to reach audit conclusions at commitment level with a reasonable level of assurance. Whereas Therefore, having documentation on internal controls in place from the beginning of the audit procedure would help to reduce the burden for both auditors and VLOPSEs, both auditors and VLOPSEs indicated to the Commission this is unlikely to happen in light of the timing the Commission is pursuing for the conversion process.

The Commission services then stated that, in the view of the Commission, discussion culminated in identifying a constructive landing zone for the first-year audit of the Code, whereby the task for VLOPSEs would consist mainly in providing a detailed explanation of the internal controls and benchmarks prior to the beginning of the audit procedure, maintaining flexibility in the interpretation of the Code commitments as applied to the relevant service. Without prejudice to the independence and professional judgement of the auditors, the Commission services stated pointed out that the more precise the information provided by VLOPSEs prior to the audit procedure is, the less likely it is that auditors may need to ask for more information. For the first audit of the Code, auditors indicated that they may then show some flexibility in how they follow up to the information received, without prejudice to their professional judgement on a case-by-case basis. For example, auditors explained that there is flexibility in designing how often metrics should be run as long as this meets the benchmark set by the VLOPSEs themselves. The Commission services indicated that, taken together, this approach is expected to lighten the workload in particular for the first audit of the Code.

3.2 Comparability and Consistency of Code audits

Auditors considered that guidance for setting materiality thresholds may help increase the consistency and comparability of the Code audit. In their view, the biggest challenge will be to assess the point beyond which compliance with Code commitments is considered sufficient. They considered that when thresholds are not clear, auditors typically feel obliged to go very far in documenting their audits to be on the safe side, which may result in unnecessarily burdensome audits for industry (including significant work to confirm systems, processes, and practices), as well as lengthy audit opinions.

Upon inquiry from VLOPSEs and auditors about a potential Commission Guidance or revision of the DR on Audits, the Commission services pointed out that the first round of Code audit reports will be a useful basis to decide whether additional guidance or revisions are needed.

3.3 Other elements discussed, including interactions between Code commitments and the DSA

As foreseen in the agenda, the discussion also focused on how to audit specific cases where Code commitments partly overlap with DSA obligations and where the implementation of Code commitments depends on third parties other than the audited company.

Regarding the first point, the Commission services stated that, in the EC's view noted that there are no conflicts between commitments under the Code and obligations under the DSA, only partial overlaps that will be addressed in the preamble to the Code. VLOPSEs disagreed, pointing out, e.g., the apparent conflict between the vetting process outlined in Article 40 of the DSA as opposed to Commitment 27 of the Code.

Using the example of the relation of Commitment 19 on transparency of recommender systems to the obligations under Article 27 DSA, the Commission pointed out that commitments under the Code overlapping with the DSA obligations add value to the latter e.g. by introducing additional reporting requirements.

The discussion also explored ways to avoid duplications between DSA and Code auditing. The Commission services pointed out that in cases where there are relatively minor only small variations in language between overlapping elements of Code commitments and DSA obligations, these should be disregarded and interpreted in favour of the legislation. For instance, if a VLOPSE has internal controls in place to comply with Article 27 DSA, the same documentation will likely be reused for the purposes of auditing the overlapping elements of Commitment 19.

VLOPSEs also inquired about auditing commitments where the implementation of certain elements is dependent on third parties. In this context, the Commission's services highlighted that certain elements of Commitment 27 will have to take into account mechanisms that have yet to be defined in the upcoming Delegated Act on Data Access and include cooperation with third parties. Auditors noted that services can scope out provisions where relevant means of compliance (such as the vetted researcher process) are not yet set up, and should therefore not be audited under the Code.

On a more general level, the Commission services pointed out that regarding commitments to support a collaborative process, it may be most appropriate to focus on auditing internal controls/governance processes that platforms have put in place, subject to the professional judgement of the auditor. Auditors confirmed that for commitments to "cooperate", VLOPSEs could explain how they interpret this cooperation and auditors would then assess whether a VLOPSE has met this definition in its cooperation actions. Moreover, auditors noted that if VLOPSEs indicate that they consider a certain element of a commitment to be out of scope of the audit, it will be marked as such in the audit report.

Background:

2024 is a pivotal year, with over 40 national elections scheduled. Countries including the US, UK, India, Brazil, and EU member states (Finland, France, Portugal, Slovakia, Belgium, Croatia, Austria, Lithuania and Romania) are heading to the polls. Notably, the EU Parliament elections took place on 6-9 June this year.

These elections will directly influence our global response to pressing issues such as climate change, trade wars, mass migration, geopolitical tensions, and crime.

Given the stakes, it is crucial for countries to monitor their online environments to ensure elections are free from interference and manipulation. Existing – but limited – evidence suggests that misinformation may have thus far had a more limited impact on political behaviour than initially feared. However, new AI-driven disinformation tools have become increasingly accessible and affordable, posing a threat to democracy.

The rise of (political) bots and computational propaganda involves the “use of algorithms, automation, and human curation to purposefully distribute misleading information over social media

networks". These tools enable bad actors to produce disinformation in myriad ways, including deepfakes, false narratives, hate speech, fake accounts, false data, and microtargeting.

Once absorbed by global social media systems, disinformation can spread rapidly. In 2023 alone, over 500,000 videos and voice deepfakes circulated online. Reports indicate that deepfakes have been used in election campaigns in Poland and Slovakia. Looking ahead, synthetic content is likely to dominate the online space, with Europol predicting that 90% of online content may be synthetically generated by 2026.

Voter concerns are at an all-time high. Recent surveys reveal that 71% of German citizens and 57% of French citizens are worried about the threats posed by AI and deepfakes. Similarly, 58% of US adults believe that the use of AI will increase misinformation. At the same time, social media companies are largely failing to curb the spread of disinformation on their platforms.

In light of these concerns Springer Nature and Library of the Council of the European Union have invited five international experts from academia, industry and civil society to share their expertise on this topic.

They will explain the new technologies and systems that are now shaping the information landscape, consider how governments are seeking to regulate these companies, discuss the impact of disinformation on free and fair elections and citizen's trust, the effect of social media echo chambers and algorithms on political polarisation, and provide insights into the likely nature of the risks and threats in the near future.

As agreed during the plenary, the subscription forms of all current signatories will be uploaded to the Transparency Center website. To this extent, VOST has created an additional section for the Transparency Center, where **both the original and the revised subscription forms will become available to the public on 22 January**. Besides submitting your subscription form to the CoP functional mailbox, no further action is needed from your side.

In this regard we also would like to remind you of the agreed silence period until 22 January, until when **contents of the submitted forms will remain confidential**, and during which (all) signatories are **kindly requested not to disclose the information contained in the submissions to the public**.

EU CODE OF PRACTICE PERMANENT TASKFORCE: Ad-scrutiny/Demonetisation Subgroup

DELIVERABLE – New SLI on demonetisation efforts, capturing the financial value (€uros) of actions taken

Content:

Objective

Under commitment 1 of the Code, Signatories are expected to report quantitatively, on actions they took to remove, block, or otherwise restrict advertising on pages and/or domains that disseminate harmful Disinformation, at the Member State or language level (existing SLI 1.1.1).

In addition, according to the same commitment, Signatories should develop a methodology to report on demonetisation efforts, including data related to the volume of advertising supporting Disinformation sources. To that end, they should propose, within 6 months, a new Service Level Indicator that provides insight into the impact of actions taken, at service and Member States levels – to be included in the first reporting exercise (as a new SLI 1.1.2).

Process and key considerations

Since July, the Ad-Scrutiny/Demonetisation Subgroup has held sessions to identify activities pertinent to demonetizing disinformation. The group ran a series of workshops that uncovered two main actions to take towards demonetising disinformation:

1. Preventing the flow of legitimate advertising investment to sites or content that are designated as disinformation (on which the SG is expected to deliver a new SLI, as required by Measure 1.1),
2. Preventing the flow of advertising investment from designated sources of disinformation.

The SG has agreed that financial values are the best way of expressing the impact of actions taken. However, we recognize that financial measures may be difficult for all signatories to divulge or produce. For that reason, and based on the diversity of the types of companies that are signatories we have identified best practice metrics for all members to work towards, while accepting that signatories will progress towards best practices over time:

In the event that a signatory is submitting a media metric (e.g., query / bid, impression), the SG has agreed to onboard an agreed-upon conversion factor (e.g., normative cost-per-thousand) to translate the media metric to a financial value. The SG has agreed that at the very least it must recognize Territory, and in the best case recognize Territory and Unit Type.

The SG also spent considerable time discussing and reviewing the lookback window for historical actions (such as impressions) and whether or not the CoP monitoring efforts should take into account previous harms rendered (e.g., advertising that was inadvertently in support of disinformation). The SG considered that a particular challenge in this context concerns the observed patterns where a persistent purveyor may deceive industry actors by acting as a legitimate entity and then shift to illegitimate activities. Pinpointing the precise date when the transition happens may prove difficult and could bring potential inaccuracies into the process (over or underestimation). The SG nevertheless concluded that impressions are an important and insightful metric to take forward and will work towards establishing an appropriate lookback window that sufficiently mitigates the risk of potential over or underestimation, in time for incorporation into the baseline reports.

Method for developing and reporting on the SLI

Method developed

¹ Metric submitted

In our review of signatory activities, we identified that the queries and bids are a common practice that brings together industry participants in the purchase or sale of media inventory. This is a common metric that is shared by ad buyers (agencies and advertisers), and ad sellers (platforms, publishers) and placement services such as adtech.

However, in our discovery of this common method we identified that costs or value are not associated with this metric as it is a pre-monetization or pre-transaction measure. In other words a query or bid is a signal on media purchasing or sale before a cost estimate is provided.

As such a conversion factor needs to be used to develop a value for the media metric (be it query / bid or impression) using a database of normative media costs at the most specific level as possible: at the market level and at the unit level.

In identifying this need, the SG has agreed that the provider must have a transparent and accepted methodology for estimating media costs that should be available to members and stakeholders of the code of practice.

Step 1: Conversions updated	Third party estimator updates normative media costs at market level and/or unit level (e.g., conversion factor)
Step 2: Conversion factors distributed	Third party estimator distributes conversion factor output to signatories
Step 3: Signatories apply conversion factor	Signatories apply conversion factor to media metric related to their actions during the reporting period
Step 4: Signatories fill in reporting	Signatories provide the results of the calculation (inserting the financial value) in the approved monitoring template to report on activity
Step 5: Monitoring quality assurance	Subgroup convenes a meeting with the signatories and third-party estimator to verify accuracy

As a result, signatories will be able to attest a certain number of euros related to demonetisation of legitimate advertising to disinformation actors in Member States, through:

SLI 1.1.2 Signatories will report on the financial value (in euros) of the actions taken to demonetise disinformation actors (as reported under SLI 1.1.1), based on media metrics available to them (query/bid or impression) and applying an agreed-upon conversion factor provided by a third party designated by the Task-force. Reporting will be provided at Member State level.

The SG will continue to explore the possibility to develop an additional SLI in relation to demonetization of advertising investment from disinformation actors in its future discussions.

Finalisation steps (ongoing)


In terms of finalizing the proposal, we need to confirm:

1. Final sign-off by signatories on the level of metrics provided by organizations
2. SG leaders to confirm that component media metric will not be distributed outside of key personnel involved in the code, monitoring, or conversion process
3. SG to finalize the selection/designation of an official third party estimator
 - a. SG to clarify the operational designation of the estimator within the code

- b. SG to confirm if any commercial requirements are necessary to compensate the third party estimator
- 4. SG to engage in ongoing discussions to determine steps taken to harmonize future submissions
- 5. SG to document reporting timelines for benchmark and subsequent waves with signatories





EU Code of Practice on Disinformation

PREAMBLE

Following European Commission "Guidance on strengthening the Code of Practice on Disinformation (hereafter the "Guidance"), the European Commission's Communication on the European Democracy Action Plan¹ (hereafter 'EDAP'), the European Commission's Communication "Tackling online disinformation: a European approach"² (hereafter the "Communication"), the Report of the High Level Expert Group³, the Council Conclusions of 28 June 2018⁴, and the various important initiatives taking place across Europe⁵ to address the challenges posed by the dissemination of disinformation, the companies and associations listed on Annex [1] ("Signatories") of this code of practice (the "Code") recognise their role in contributing to solutions to the challenges posed by misinformation and disinformation⁶.

As provided under the EDAP, "Misinformation" is defined as: "false or misleading content shared without harmful intent though the effects can still be harmful, e.g. when people share false information with friends and family in good faith."

In the same Communication, "Disinformation" is defined as : "false or misleading content that is spread with an intention to deceive or secure economic or political gain and which may cause public harm."

The notion of "Disinformation" does not include misleading advertising, reporting errors, satire and parody, or clearly identified partisan news and commentary, and is without prejudice to binding legal obligations, self-regulatory advertising codes, and standards regarding misleading advertising.

Commented [A1]: Signatories might want to consider to add to the Preamble additional considerations from the Guidance, in particular on the broader scope of the new Code with a wider participation and new services to be covered, such as messaging apps.

Commented [A2]: Signatories might want to consider to add a reference to the DSA proposal.

In this context it is important to recall that the strengthening of the Code called for in the Guidance aims at establishing a co-regulatory framework for fighting disinformation for VLOPs. In that view we would suggest signatories to clarify that the strengthened Code should become the Code of Conduct that VLOP will adhere and comply to, once the DSA will be adopted, in order to take appropriate risk mitigating measure against disinformation.

At the same time, for those signatories that are not VLOPs, the Code will remain a Code of Practice without co-regulatory enforcement mechanism.

Signatories may want to consider to clarify this dual nature of the Code in the Preamble.

Commented [A3]: Signatories might want to be clearer in the preamble how they are planning to approach misinformation.

One way of approaching this could be to specify depending on the chapter and/or specific commitments to what extent the commitments / the measures apply to misinformation.

For reference we recall here the text of the Guidance: "While the main target remains disinformation in the narrow sense", in the strengthened Code signatories should commit to have in place appropriate policies ...

Commented [A4]: We would suggest signatories to reconsider using this example and consider rather the use of a more general wording, given in section 3.2 of Guidance, that better reflects the spirit of extending the scope of the Code regarding misinformation. There misinformation is defined as "false or misleading information spread without malicious intent".

The example used – sharing content with friends with family – may be misleading as it minimises the potential impact of misinformation, as misinformation is often circulated to a much wider audience than family ...

Commented [A5]: To avoid confusion, Signatories may want to clarify this formulation, to differentiate between "misleading advertising" and advertising containing disinformation.

While "misleading advertising" i.e. misleading or comparative advertising in the sense of the relevant legislation may be outside of the scope of the Code, advertising that contains disinformation should be clearly covered by the Code as foreseen in section 4.3 of the Guidance: "Commitments to address advertising containing disinformation" ...

The Signatories recognise and agree with the Commission's conclusions that "the exposure of citizens to large scale Disinformation, including misleading or outright false information, is a major challenge for Europe. Our open democratic societies depend on public debates that allow well-informed citizens to express their will through free and fair political processes".⁷

As the Commission repeatedly acknowledges in its Guidance, the EDAP, and the Communication,⁸ the Signatories are mindful of the fundamental right to freedom of expression and to an open Internet, and the delicate balance which any efforts to limit the spread and impact of otherwise lawful content must strike.

In recognition that the dissemination of Disinformation has many facets and is facilitated by and impacts a very broad segment of actors in the ecosystem, all stakeholders have roles to play in countering its spread.

It is in this spirit that the Signatories have drafted the present Code, its sign-up forms identifying the commitment areas each signatory is making, and a transitional plan translating these commitments into concrete actions that will be shared with the European Commission. These additional elements are an integral part of this Code, and hereby, the Signatories commit themselves to adhere to the relevant commitments listed next to their names. Given the breadth of the commitments outlined in the Code and the heterogeneous range of stakeholders involved, Signatories need not sign up to every commitment. Signatories will sign up to commitments which correspond to the product(s) and/or service(s) they offer, their roles in the value chain, their technical capabilities and their liability regimes as provided under EU Law, which vary depending on the role they play in the creation and dissemination of the content at stake. Hence, the Code refers to the individual Signatory that has accepted certain commitments as indicated on individual sign-up forms with the expression "Appropriate Signatory". This does not commit all Signatories of the Code to sign up to every commitment. Sign-up forms will include each Signatory's reasons for the commitments they did and did not elect to accept.

The Signatories recognize that because the various Signatories operate differently, with different purposes, technologies and audiences, the Code allows for different approaches to accomplishing the spirit of the provisions herein. Stakeholders who help address the spread of disinformation through their tools, technical efforts, philanthropic work⁹, or specific expertise, could also become signatories, adopting commitments that are attuned to the company or organisation and the particular role they play in the online ecosystem¹⁰.

Commented [A6]: As discussed previously, transitional plans need to be made public, to allow the necessary transparency and public scrutiny. They can not be shared with the Commission only. We suggest to reflect this in the preamble. Signatories might also want to consider mentioning in the preamble that transitional plans will contain a clear timeframe for the swift implementation of the Code's commitments with clear milestones and deadlines. Signatories may also want to indicate here the general timeframe for the implementation / transitional period of the Code that should overall take no more than 3-6 months.

Commented [A7]: We would suggest to clarify/spell it out what is meant by "additional elements".

Commented [A8]: Signatories may want to consider to nuance this statement, to be in line with the expectation set out in the Guidance that signatories should sign up to all commitments that are relevant for their services.

The Guidance states in this regard: "Signatories should sign up to the commitments that are relevant for their services. While participation in the Code and subscription to its commitments remain voluntary, in order to ensure the Code's effectiveness as a risk mitigation tool, signatories should not, in principle, opt out of commitments that are relevant for their services".

See related to this also the next comment.

Commented [A9]: Signatories might want to review this sentence to make sure that it may not be misleading to the reader. The Guidance makes it clear that "signatories should not opt out of commitments that are relevant for their services". (see full reference to the relevant part of the Guidance in the above comment). We would suggest to consider clarifying this sentence to make sure that it fully reflects the spirit of the Guidance.

We would suggest as well that Signatories consider adding a commitment in the preamble or closing that signatories will review their commitments (in the annual reports) and sign up to additional ones if they became applicable in the meantime.

Commented [A10]: See the comments above. We would suggest to revise the drafting to make sure that the formulations may not cause misunderstandings and fully reflect the spirit of the Guidance.

Commented [A11]: See the comments above. In that view Signatories might also want to review this sentence to make sure that it properly reflects the spirit of the Guidance regarding the requirement that signatories should not opt out of commitments that are relevant for their services. This could be e.g. done by referring to the signatories reasons for not signing up to the commitment in question.

It is also suggested that signatories consider to reflect here that the sign-up forms should also clarify how the commitments relate to the different services provided by the Signatory.

...

The Signatories recognise that trade associations that have signed this Code are not entering into obligations on behalf of their members. However, these associations commit to make their members fully aware of this Code, and encourage them to join it or respect its principles, as appropriate.

The application of this Code is limited for each Signatory to services provided in the States that are Contracting Parties to the European Economic Area.

Signatories, including signatory associations, commit to undertake the actions provided for by this Code in a manner that ensures full compliance with EU and national competition law. By way of example, Signatories must not discuss, communicate or exchange any commercially sensitive information. This includes non-public information on: prices; marketing and advertising strategy; costs and revenues; trading terms and conditions with third parties (including purchasing strategy); terms of supply; trade programmes or distribution strategy.

The Code shall apply within the framework of existing laws of the EU and its Member States and must not be construed in any way as replacing or interpreting the existing legal framework, and, in particular (but not limited to):

- The EU Charter of Fundamental Rights;
- The European Convention on Human Rights;
- Directive 2000/31/EC, with particular reference to Articles 12 to 15, which shall apply to any obligation of this Code targeting or assumed by mere conduits, caching providers, or hosting providers such as providers of network, search engines, browsers, online blogging platforms, online forums, video-sharing platforms, social media, etc.;
- Regulation (EU) 2016/679 on the protection of natural persons with regard to the processing of personal data and on the free movement of such data;
- Directive 2005/29/EC concerning unfair business-to-consumer commercial practices in the internal market;
- Directive 2006/114/EC concerning misleading and comparative advertising;
- The case law of the CJEU and ECHR on the proportionality of measures designed to limit access to and circulation of harmful content.

I. PURPOSES

The purpose of this Code is to identify the actions that Signatories could put in place in order to address the challenges related to "Disinformation"

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Commented [A12]: Signatories may want to consider to include here that trade associations also commit to work towards evolving the Code in a way that prepares the ground for their membership to join it.

Commented [A13]: Signatories may want to consider adding a reference also to the relevant legislative proposals, notably the DSA and the proposal on sponsored political content.

Commented [A14]: Signatories might want to reflect on the need and relevance of this section and consider replacing it by a more general and up-to-date formulation that properly reflects the scope and areas of the revised Code.

While the objectives/purposes of the Code may be recalled, the current drafting may be overly detailed and appear redundant with the specific parts expected on commitments. It may also be misleading as it singles out some of the commitments of the previous Code while not mentioning other important areas for the revised Code.

The signatories might rather want to include in this section an overall declaration of intent based on the main chapters of the Guidance where actions are expected (e.g.):

- 1/ scrutiny of ad placement:
 - demonetising disinformation;
 - improving cooperation;
 - address advertising containing disinfo.
- 2/ political advertising and issue-based ad:
 - efficient labelling.

A revisited section could keep certain "horizontal" elements, which give an indication on how Signatories intend to operationalise the Code. These could be aspects related to e.g. the Code's governance, related to the use of key performance indicators and the monitoring process.

A reference to the 'living-nature' of the Code could be also considered, indicating that the Code will be subject to review by the Task-force, in view of evolving the Code in view of technological, societal market and legislative developments.

Signatories may also want to consider to indicate it here that the Code remains open for other Signatories to join.

Commented [A15]: Signatories might consider a revised language that reflects the objective and nature of the Code: For instance they might say "Signatories will put in place" or "commit to put in place"

In line with the Commission's Communication, the Signatories of the Code of Practice recognise the importance of efforts to:

- (i) Include safeguards against Disinformation and related misuses of services;
- (ii) Strengthen transparency and accountability around ad placements by developing or implementing effective means to further reduce economic incentives for the spread of disinformation;
- (iii) Ensure transparency about political and issue-based advertising, also with a view to enabling users to understand why they have been targeted by a given advertisement;
- (iv) Implement and promote reasonable policies against misrepresentation;
- (v) Intensify and demonstrate the effectiveness of efforts to close fake accounts and establish clear marking systems and rules for bots to ensure their activities cannot be confused with human interactions;
- (vi) Intensify and communicate on the effectiveness of efforts to ensure the integrity of services with regards to accounts whose purpose and intent¹¹ is to spread disinformation, as per specifics assessed and determined by the Relevant Signatory, and consistently with Article 8 of the European Convention on Human Rights, the fundamental right of anonymity and pseudonymity, and the proportionality principle. Consistently with Article 10 of the European Convention on Human Rights and the principle of freedom of opinion, invest in technological means to promote and where relevant prioritise relevant, authentic, and accurate and authoritative information where appropriate in search, feeds, or other automatically ranked distribution channels and invest in features that empower users to make informed decisions about the content they encounter online. In the context of the COVID-19 pandemic, signatories implemented various solutions that prioritise and lead users to authoritative sources (e.g. ranking systems, information panels, banners, pop-ups, maps and prompts) and will continue to build on this experience to develop and apply such tools on topics of particular public and societal interest or in crisis situations. Be that as it may, Signatories should not be compelled by governments, nor should they be forced to adopt policies, to delete or prevent access to otherwise lawful content or messages".
- (vii) Consider empowering users with tools enabling a customized and interactive online experience so as to facilitate content discovery and access to different news sources representing alternative viewpoints, also providing them with easily-accessible tools to report Disinformation.

¹¹ Certain signatories are often not able to accurately infer intent from online content or account level data due to the nature of their service/product.

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- (viii) Improve transparency regarding the main parameters, including context, used for prioritising or deprioritising information, and invest in user controls for the content that they see. Also, consider using risk management techniques to mitigate risks of recommender systems inadvertently spreading disinformation.
- (ix) Work to enable privacy-compliant access to data for fact-checking and research activities. To that end Signatories will work, in cooperation with the research community, EDMO and relevant national authorities, towards an operational framework for privacy-compliant access to data on advertising and the functioning of their services with respect to the spread of disinformation for independent investigation by good-faith vetted researchers
- (x) Work towards a consistent implementation of the commitments across EU Member States, where the Signatory is operational.
- (xi) Support the fact-checking community's work to provide people with reliable information and their efforts to increase the coverage of their activities across EU Member States.

This Code is without prejudice to other initiatives aiming at tackling Disinformation on platforms.

This Code is agreed in good faith between the Signatories, building on a fair and honest representation of their intentions. For the sake of allowing a more comprehensive understanding of the Code, the commitments listed in the following paragraph are introduced by an explanation of the detailed purposes and context related to each group of commitments in the five relevant fields addressed by the Code.

Commented [A16]: DOT EUROPE: Our members would not be against sharing data in good-faith but we understand that eventually companies would need to make assessments on a case-by-case basis, as any of this would be subject to their own business obligations including confidentiality requirements, etc. The 'operational framework' sound quite ambitious, yet it is not really clear what would it entail, and from that perspective we would be more comfortable talking about 'enabling giving access to data...'.

The second tweak 'insight into' is to ensure alignment with the first change. Otherwise, this text would no longer make sense.

Commented [A17]: COM: As stated previously, we suggest to remove such details from this section.

Regarding the issue of access to data for research purposes, the Guidance aims at creating the condition for researchers to carry out research" essential to the proper understanding of the evolution of the risks linked to disinformation and can contribute to the development of risk mitigation mechanisms". Improving access to data for researchers is a key area of the Guidance where significant improvement is expected.

According to the Guidance the aim of the strengthened Code should be to" create a framework that, already in the interim before the DSA's adoption, allows researchers the necessary access to platform data and also facilitates in the long term the development of a specific framework for data access tailored for conducting research on the disinformation phenomena". Under the framework "The conditions for access should be transparent, open and non-discriminatory, proportionate and justified" and "provide for the possibility of real-time access to certain types of data, in order to enable the prompt assessment of emerging or evolving risks and the design of appropriate mitigation measures"

Commented [A18]: This could be a useful horizontal element to add in this chapter or another part of the preamble.

Commented [A19]: See the comment above related to the entire section "Purposes". We suggest revising this section in that view.

Therefore we do not give specific comments related to the list with the exception of data sharing – to react to the DOT comment – and to indicate that the element on MS level implementation is an important issue that could be indeed mentioned as a horizontal issue.

3	Account, whose face is a young woman. The account is problematic due to continued propagation of prorussian narratives, justifies the invasion to Ukraine, shares other conspiracies and unsupported claims about behaviour of certain geopolitical actors without proofs, spreads anti-western narratives. It calls Ukraine „Banderistan“ repeatedly. Claims the existence of censorship in EU, but rarely touches domestic politics.	
4	This account has been spreading conspiracy theories about vaccines and COVID-19 pandemics. It claims vaccination is harmful, and that it was supposedly responsible for deaths of people. Spreads pro-russian and anti-west narratives, russian narratives about the war in Ukraine, and decreases the trust in public institutions. Accuses Ukraine of genocide, conspires about the death of Milan Lučanský. The account „tinamartina316.g was probably suspended or deleted, therefore, it must have repeatedly violated the Community Guidelines of TikTok. Despite that, the newer account tinamartina316g continues as a replacement of aforementioned suspended account, and even shares the content from the previous account, which is visible thanks to the watermark of the suspended account in the videos of the new account.	
5		
6	An account, which spreads intense anti-Ukrainian narratives, conspiracies, in some videos even indirectly threatens other groups of people (“progressives”), intensifies the distrust in institutions (for example by talking about a coup in police or the right to resist). The author himself claims that he was banned on Facebook and that brought him to TikTok, but his account on Facebook is active. Furthermore, author spreads disinformation such as rejecting the US landing on the Moon too. He actively defends actions of Vladimir Putin.	
7	Two accounts of Danny Kollár, known conspirator and a person with 3 arrest warrants to his name. Both have been suspended, but a new account replacing the suspended ones is likely to appear.

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13	A rather well-known and popular Slovak account. Most of the content is non-problematic and focused on entertainment. However, Adrián Figo has been sharing disinformation on the profile about immigrants, Covid-19, and supported Vladimir Putin. Figo himself lately announced plans for his own political party.
14	An account, which according to the author herself is already a replacement for previously suspended or banned accounts. In videos, the author claims that in case of banning this account, she will proceed with establishing a new one (Žužu4, 5, 6...). The account spreads a considerable amount of hoaxes and conspiracies, anti-immigrant hate speech, shares interviews and speeches of Danny Kollár (Daniel Bombic - wanted by 3 arrest warrants), disinformation on vaccinations and anti-ukrainian narratives, including hate speech. The account openly shares and supports several politicians and political parties in Slovakia.
15	Already a third version of the account, that has been suspended two times during the analysis since late July. Openly supports Russian aggression in Ukraine, including sharing Russian narratives about the war. Shares content from Brat za brata movement, hoaxes and conspiracies against immigrants and the west. The author has repeatedly reposted content originally posted on the banned accounts, and has a watermark of the previous account. He has also shared a video about "censorship" and promotes his back-up account.

Concentrates on sharing and spreading anti-Ukrainian propaganda, describing the country as fascist, President Zelensky as a narc, sharing narratives about biological labs in Ukraine and similar.
20	This account uses a question "The truth or a hoax?" in its every post. By this, it does not provide statements, but despite that shares predominantly anti-Ukrainian and pro-Russian content, conspiracies about Covid-19, and other anti-establishment narratives and videos. Also other conspiracies were detected, such as claiming that Earth is not a globe, the existence of Chemtrails, or the benefits of Ivermectin.

The account very often uses hashtags, such as "glory to Russia" "Ukraine fascists" and similar. Shares Russian and anti-Ukrainian propaganda. The account has been working with anti-immigration narratives and conspiracies in the last weeks as well.
23	A channel, which promotes solely the videos of Peter Stanek. Stanek has been known to spread doubts about the climate change, and other conspiracies about New World Order. He has also continuously been spreading fake news and disinformation about the war in Ukraine and pro-Russian narratives. He has also spread conspiracies and disinformation about health issues, such as cancer treatment.

In addition to that, anti-Western propaganda is prevalent, including sharing articles from sources such as RIA Novosti.

26	A smaller, personal account, which reshares the interviews and videos with Štefan Harabin, known element of conspiracy sharing. 27	The account spreads conspiracies such as questioning the authenticity of Moon landing, hidden elites in control of the World, but predominantly focuses on spreading Russian propaganda, narratives, and even directly uses materials from Russian media, webpages, or other sources. 32	This account is highly political. Marek Šoun was a candidate for 2020 elections, however, unsuccesful. He is closely aligned with Smer-SSD political party, although not running in 2023 elections. Besides promoting this specific political party, which is not problematic, he shares content which is either directly anti-west and pro-russian, often operating with conspiracies, narratives unsupported by evidence. In the past, the author organised a "raid against doctors" during Covid-19 pandemic and claimed that at in Ukraine, US soldiers fought disguised as the Russian army.
33	Another account focusing on Slovak domestic politics. Reshared videos with Danny Kollár, and often accuses ideological opponents with unsupported claims and operates with fear of migrants. However, despite most of the content being aggressive, it most probably complies with the Community standards
34	A personal account, which is rather influential with its range and number of likes. In some of the posts, it tackles Slovak politics, often in a misleading way. Featured videos promoting anti-Ukrainian narratives. However, most of the content is not problematic.
35	This account is owned by a person, who records himself commenting various developments in geopolitics, economics and inflation, but also many other topics. The person behind spreads substantial amount of disinformation, including conspiracies about deep state, hoaxes about Ukraine and its regime, such as child trafficking, accuses west of hybrid warfare against the Slavs by e.g. manipulating the weather, and promoting similar content, such as questioning the climate change or conspiracies about aggressive nature of NATO.
36	The account "exotickyduch82" has been suspended for breaching Community standards, however, another account has been established in the beginning of September and has already posted tens of videos. Anti-LGBTI hate speech can be found on the platform.
