Dear Director Hughes:

The Committee on the Judiciary is conducting oversight of state and local jurisdictions that endanger American communities through their refusal to cooperate with federal immigration officials. The Illinois Department of Corrections' (IDOC) immigration-related policies prioritize criminal and illegal aliens over American citizens and threaten public safety. We write to request information about Illinois's sanctuary policies, including IDOC's lack of cooperation with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to ensure that dangerous aliens are not released onto American streets.

To protect communities from criminal aliens in law enforcement custody, ICE uses detainers, which are simple requests that a law enforcement agency "notify [ICE] as early as possible before [the agency] release[s] a removable alien" and "[h]old the alien for up to 48 hours beyond the time [the agency] would ordinarily release them so [the Department of Homeland Security] has time to assume custody in accordance with federal immigration law."¹ Federal law prohibits jurisdictions from restricting ICE's requests for and receipt of individuals' citizenship information.² For years, Illinois's sanctuary laws have prevented IDOC from complying with ICE detainers.³ Illinois law also insulates officials from criminal liability for releasing dangerous criminal aliens despite ICE detainers.⁴

Illinois's pro-illegal alien policies ensure dangerous criminals are released from your custody and free to reoffend. In the last year, ICE has arrested numerous criminal aliens that

IDOC released back into Illinois communities instead of honoring ICE detainees, including a Mexican national sentenced to 30 years in IDOC custody for attempted murder, aggravated criminal sexual assault with bodily harm, and aggravated kidnapping; a Mexican national convicted of attempted murder with intent to kill; and a Mexican national sentenced to 17 years' imprisonment for assault on a child.⁵ IDOC also previously released a Jamaican national who had served 28 years in prison for murder.⁶ In less than 11 months in 2025, Illinois's sanctuary policies led to the release of nearly 2,000 criminals.⁷

Illinois's sanctuary policies endanger the communities you serve. Like other sanctuary jurisdictions we have examined, the shielding of criminal aliens from immigration enforcement in Illinois undermines public safety and thwarts the efficient enforcement of federal law. Accordingly, to assist the Committee with its continued oversight of federal immigration policy and to inform potential legislative reforms to address sanctuary policies, we ask that you provide the following information:

1. All documents and communications referring or relating to IDOC's interaction with ICE for the period January 1, 2018, to the present;
2. All documents and communications referring or relating to IDOC's policies, practices, and procedures related to non-U.S. citizens for the period January 1, 2018, to the present;
3. The number of ICE detainees that IDOC has received and has declined to honor for the period January 1, 2018, to the present;
4. All reports sent to the Illinois Attorney General to fulfill the reporting requirements under 5 Ill. Comp. Stat. Ann. 805/25 for the period January 1, 2018, to the present;
5. All documents and communications between or among IDOC, the Chicago Police Department, the Cook County Sheriff's Office, and the Cook County State's Attorney's Office referring or relating to immigration enforcement for the period January 1, 2018, to the present; and
6. All documents and communications between or among IDOC and the Illinois Governor's Office referring or relating to immigration and immigration enforcement for the period January 1, 2018, to the present.
