

1 from foreign investments in United States busi-
2 nesses and real estate;

3 (4) prioritize, with respect to PRC-based indi-
4 viduals or entities, or those acting as their agents—

5 (A) identifying and criminally prosecuting
6 those engaged in trade secret theft, hacking,
7 and economic espionage, including those who
8 aid, abet, or conspire to engage in trade secret
9 theft, hacking, or economic espionage;

10 (B) protecting the critical infrastructure of
11 the United States from threats arising from
12 foreign direct investment, insider threats and
13 supply chain compromises; and

14 (C) identifying theft of intellectual prop-
15 erty from United States businesses; and

16 (5) counter any other threats to the United
17 States by the PRC or those acting as its agents.

18 (b) CONSULTATION.—In executing the CCP Initia-
19 tive’s objectives as set forth in subsection (a), the Attorney
20 General, acting through the Assistant Attorney General
21 for National Security, shall consult with the relevant com-
22 ponents of the Department of Justice, and coordinate ac-
23 tivities with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and any
24 other Federal agency as necessary on matters including—

1 (1) identifying cases of concern involving PRC-
2 based companies that compete with United States
3 businesses;

4 (2) identifying and investigating investments
5 made by PRC-based or PRC-affiliated entities in-
6 cluded on the Entity List maintained by the Bureau
7 of Industry and Security of the Department of Com-
8 merce or the People's Republic of China Military
9 Companies list maintained by the Department of
10 Defense; and

11 (3) any other matters relevant to fulfill the ob-
12 jectives set forth in subsection (a).

13 (c) REQUIREMENT.—Under the CCP Initiative—

14 (1) the Initiative shall be separate from any
15 other Department of Justice initiative dedicated to
16 countering nation-state threats; and

17 (2) resources shall be set aside for the CCP Ini-
18 tiative, which shall not be combined to support any
19 other Department of Justice program, including
20 other programs and initiatives dedicated to coun-
21 tering nation-state threats, except under exceptional
22 circumstances, as determined by the Attorney Gen-
23 eral, acting through the Assistant Attorney General
24 for National Security, in which case, resources may

1 be combined to support other programs and initia-
2 tives dedicated to countering nation-state threats.

3 (d) ANNUAL REPORT.—The Attorney General shall
4 submit annually a written report, with a classified annex
5 as necessary, in consultation with the Secretary of Com-
6 merce, the Secretary of the Treasury, the intelligence com-
7 munity, the United States Trade Representative, and the
8 head of any other Federal agency determined necessary
9 by the Attorney General, for the purposes of the report,
10 to the Committee on Homeland Security and Govern-
11 mental Affairs and the Committee on the Judiciary of the
12 Senate, and the Committee on Homeland Security and the
13 Committee on the Judiciary of the House of Representa-
14 tives, on the progress and challenges of the CCP Initiative
15 over the preceding year, including—

16 (1) its progress in accomplishing the objectives
17 set forth in subsection (a);

18 (2) the amount and sufficiency of resources
19 provided to, and expended by, the CCP Initiative;

20 (3) the level and effectiveness of coordination
21 with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and other
22 Federal agencies;

23 (4) the status of efforts by and the financial in-
24 telligence capabilities of the PRC to engage in trade
25 secret theft, hacking, and economic espionage;

1 (5) an analysis of the use of unmanned aircraft
2 and associated elements (including communication
3 links and the components that control the unmanned
4 aircraft required for the operator to operate safely
5 and efficiently in the national airspace system) by
6 the PRC;

7 (6) an analysis of the capabilities, effectiveness,
8 and use of artificial intelligence by the PRC and its
9 proxies to engage in trade secret theft, hacking, or
10 economic espionage;

11 (7) any non-privileged findings of investigations
12 of investments made by PRC-based or PRC-affili-
13 ated entities included on the Entity List maintained
14 by the Bureau of Industry and Security of the De-
15 partment of Commerce or the People's Republic of
16 China Military Companies list maintained by the
17 Department of Defense, including findings related to
18 subsidiaries or other entities controlled by PRC com-
19 panies, whether or not such subsidiaries or other en-
20 tities are registered in or operate in the PRC;

21 (8) the impact of the CCP Initiative on those
22 efforts of the PRC;

23 (9) the level and effectiveness of coordination
24 and information sharing between Government agen-

1 cies and private companies about economic espio-
2 nage threats; and

3 (10) an assessment of the economic loss to the
4 United States as a result of hacking and trade se-
5 cret theft by the PRC.

6 (e) SUNSET.—This Act shall take effect on the date
7 of enactment of this Act and cease to be in effect on the
8 date that is 6 years after that date.

9 (f) SEVERABILITY.—If any provision of this Act, or
10 the application of such provision to any person or cir-
11 cumstance, is held to be unconstitutional, the remainder
12 of this Act, and the application of the provisions of such
13 to any person or circumstance, shall not be affected there-
14 by.

15 (g) DEFINITIONS.—In this Act:

16 (1) The term “non-traditional collector” means
17 an individual who is not an intelligence collection
18 professional but who collects sensitive technologies
19 and information on behalf of, or for the benefit of,
20 any foreign government, foreign instrumentality, or
21 foreign agent.

22 (2) The term “CCP” means the Chinese Com-
23 munist Party.

1 (3) The term “PRC” means the People’s Re-
2 public of China, the government of the People’s Re-
3 public of China, and the CCP.

4 (4) The term “intelligence community” has the
5 meaning given such term in section 3(4) of the Na-
6 tional Security Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 3003(4))
